HEALTH RESOURCES

Before we share information about on and off campus health resources, we would like to begin with a general overview of health insurance in the United States. This information was compiled by the Illinois International Student and Scholar Services (ISSS).

DIFFERENT TYPES OF HEALTH INSURANCE PLANS

There are three main types of health insurance plans available in the U.S.

- **Indemnity plan.** Under this type of plan, you pay a premium for the insurance and a fixed percentage of covered expenses, plus any deductibles and co-payments. You may choose your physician and refer yourself to specialists.
- **PPO (Preferred Provider Organization).** A PPO is similar to an indemnity plan. However, you pay less for care received through one of the plan's preferred physicians or facilities.
- HMO (Health Maintenance Organization). Under an HMO, you pay a premium for the insurance and a fixed copayment for covered services. You must select a "primary care physician" approved by the HMO. All treatment, including that rendered by specialists and at facilities outside the HMO network, must be done on the basis of a referral by your primary care physician and must sometimes be pre-approved by the HMO. The HMO may refuse to pay for services that were not recommended by your primary care physician.

CHOOSING THE RIGHT INSURANCE PLAN

When choosing an insurance plan, cost is just one consideration. You should also understand the features of each plan. Ask questions like:

- Which treatments are covered, and what is excluded?
- How much must you pay toward a deductible or copayment?
- Will the insurance pay for any medical conditions that existed at the time that you purchased the insurance?
- Is it important that you have access to specialists?
- In the case of HMO and PPO plans, is there a wide selection of primary care physicians, specialists, and hospitals or clinics affiliated with the insurance?
- Is there a maximum amount that the insurance will pay for each problem annually or over the lifetime of your coverage?
- How quickly does the company process claims?

To select the best insurance, you must consider your situation and that of any dependents. For instance, if you suffer from a chronic health condition, you should avoid purchasing insurance that exempts pre-existing conditions. If you choose an HMO or PPO, find out if there is a specialist in the network who can provide treatment. Some insurance plans have very low premiums, but have high deductibles, copayments, and many exemptions. These "catastrophic" plans provide little or no benefit for most medical problems.

UNDERSTANDING INSURANCE TERMINOLOGY

As you evaluate insurance plans, it is helpful to understand some common insurance terminology. Once you choose a plan, it is vital that you read the policy carefully to understand how your health insurance company defines these terms and any others.

- **Premium** is the amount that you must pay to purchase insurance coverage.
- **Deductible or co-payment** is the portion of your medical bill that you must pay.
- **Out-of-pocket maximum** is the highest amount that you must pay before the insurance covers 100% of the cost of treatment.
- Aggregate maximum or lifetime cap is the maximum dollar amount that your insurance will pay for benefits over your lifetime or that of your insured dependents.

- **Usual and customary** is the average fee that a health care provider charges for any given service in your geographic area.
- **Exclusions and limitations** are benefits that are not paid for by your insurance company.
- **Pre-existing condition** is any medical problem that was already diagnosed or that existed prior to purchasing the health insurance. Many plans exclude pre-existing conditions from coverage. The Student Health Insurance plan does not exclude pre-existing conditions.
- **Pre-authorization** is the approval that you must obtain from your insurance provider prior to treatment for nonemergency care.
- **Claim** is a formal request for payment of benefits covered under the insurance program, after service is rendered and expenses are incurred.

FILING A CLAIM

Read your insurance brochure to find out how and when claims for benefits should be filed with the insurance company. Also ask your health care provider or hospital if they will file the claim on your behalf. If not, will they require payment for services immediately or wait for your insurance to first pay the portion of your bill as provided under your plan? Be prepared to show your insurance card to your provider at the time of service. If you purchase insurance from a source other than an HMO, ask the company to give you a claim form when you buy the insurance. Keep copies of all bills and papers related to claims for at least one year.

USING INSURANCE WISELY

Once you select your health insurance, it is important to use it wisely. Use the hospital emergency room (ER) only in the case of a true emergency. Read your insurance policy carefully before you need to use it. Your insurance company may refuse payment if you receive treatment for an excludable condition, or if you do not follow insurance protocol for treatment. Ask your health care provider for a cost estimate for any treatment you might receive, especially prior to surgery or hospitalization. Then consult with your insurance company about the coverage you might expect. By taking these measures, you can keep your health care costs down.

Remember: Health insurance coverage is required for all J-1 exchange visitors and their dependents. The U.S. Department of State has established minimum requirements for insurance coverage in order to protect J-1 participants and their family members in case of illness or accident. These requirements include:

- Maximum coverage for medical benefits cannot be less than \$100,000 per accident or illness.
- If you should die in the United States, your insurance must provide at least \$25,000 to send your remains to your home country. This is called "repatriation of remains."
- If, because of serious illness or injury, you must be sent home on the advice of a doctor, the insurance must pay up to \$50,000 for the expenses of your travel. This is called "medical evacuation."
- The deductible cannot be more than \$500 per accident or illness. This is the amount you would have to pay before the insurance company pays anything. Many policies have a much lower deductible, which is good for you.
- The insurance must pay at least 75% of covered medical expenses. After you have paid the deductible, an insurance policy usually only pays a percentage of your medical expenses, and you pay the rest. The percentage you pay is called co-insurance or a co-payment.
- The policy may establish a waiting period before it covers pre-existing conditions (health problems you had before you bought the insurance), as long as the waiting period is reasonable by current standards in the insurance industry.
- The policy must be backed by the full faith and credit of your home country government or the company providing the insurance must meet minimum rating requirements established by the State Department (an A.M. best rating of A- or above, and Insurance Solvency International Ltd. (ISI) rating of A- or above, a Standard and Poor's Claims-paying ability rating of A- or above, or a Weiss Research, Inc. rating of B+ or above).

• Most insurance policies exclude coverage for certain conditions. The J-1 regulations require that if a particular activity is a part of your exchange visitor program, your insurance must cover injuries resulting from your participation in that activity.

All J-1 visitors will need to show that they have obtained insurance coverage before starting their program, and again before making certain changes to their program (adding dependents, travel, or program extension).

MONEY AND BANKING

CURRENCY

American currency is based on the decimal system with 100 cents (¢) to each dollar (\$). Currency is issued in coins or bills. The names and values of the coins are as follows:

- Penny: 1 cent. The only copper colored coin.
- Nickel: 5 cents. Larger than a penny; silver colored.
- Dime: 10 cents. The smallest coin (although not the lowest value); silver colored.
- Quarter: 25 cents. Larger than a nickel; silver colored.
- Half-dollar: 50 cents. Larger than a quarter; silver colored; rarely used.
- Silver dollar: 100 cents. The largest coin; silver colored; rarely used.

BANK ACCOUNTS

There are two basic types of bank accounts: checking accounts and savings accounts. When you go to open your account, take your passport and immigration documents with you to serve as identification.

- Checking account: With a checking account you can deposit your money in the account and access those funds
 with a debit card or by writing a personal check. The bank will provide you with a debit card and a few checks to
 get you started; additional checks can be ordered for a fee. Some checking accounts have a minimum balance
 requirement. If you go below the minimum, you will be charged a fee. Be sure to ask about any requirements when
 you go to open your account.
- **Savings account:** If you have money that you do not need to use immediately, you may want to open a savings account. The advantage of a savings account is that money in the account earns a small amount of interest. As with checking accounts, there is normally a minimum account balance requirement. If your account balance falls below the minimum requirement, the bank will deduct a monthly fee from your account.

ATMS & DEBIT CARDS

A debit card can be used to purchase goods and services in stores and online. They are given with most new checking accounts. They can be used anywhere credit cards are accepted. Unlike a credit card, however, the funds are immediately deducted from your account balance when you make a purchase. A debit card allows you to get cash, make deposits, transfer funds, or check your account balance at any time of the day or night from a bank ATM (automated teller machine). You may be charged a fee for using an ATM from another bank. Never give your personal identification number (PIN) or card information to anyone.

- Most phone companies only require Social Security numbers for contracted plans. Without a Social Security
 number many will require a deposit for contracted plans.
- It is common practice that the provider will to take photocopies of your passport and visa. Be sure to bring these documents with you.

Pre-pay/Pay-as-you-go phones:

 Many companies offer a pre-paid cell phone, which does not require a contract. You can purchase the phone and minutes at each store, or you can visit major supermarkets for more pre-paid options. You will not be required to provide your Social Security number.


