Vision


At Brasillinois, our vision is to cultivate a dynamic and inclusive global community, united by a shared commitment to innovation, collaboration, and positive societal impact.

Brasillinois Research Clusters



Democracy & Inclusion

We will pursue collaborative projects to increase global awareness among students from Illinois and Brazil through exchange and mobility programs and focus on research on historical and contemporary areas of social inclusion in the two largest democracies of the Americas



Climate & Sustainability

This cluster also develops areas including food security, water resources, bioeconomy, and atmospheric sciences. Efforts building on longstanding research collaborations in crop sciences, sustainability, water resources, and environmental sciences have been foundational for Illinois' relationship with Brazil.



Public Health & Medicine

We will pursue initiatives focused on increasing life expectancy based upon data and community initiatives that combine experiences and practices in Illinois and Brazil with pilot programs in urban and rural communities, and establishing cohort studies in Illinois and Brazil that build longitudinal health data sets.



Student Mobility

The student mobility program will bring over 100 Brazilian undergraduates and doctoral students to the University of Illinois System's universities over the next few years. Undergraduates will spend a semester in Illinois, while doctoral students will be classified as visiting scholars for a period ranging from three to 10 months. Additionally, faculty members participating in the program will have opportunities to visit Brazilian partner universities to strengthen academic collaboration. They will apply through Capes to be involved.





Upcoming Brasillinois Opportunities


- Brasillinois course buyout opportunties to focus on research: likely call to be issued in spring semester.
- Call for collaborative research funding with FAPESP: likely be issued in October
- Call for collaborative research funding with Fiocruz National Public Health Institute: likely be open early 2025, the range of activities of Fiocruz definitely connects with the cluster areas such as education, equity, social science research, and history.
- FAPESP welcomes proposals for schools of advanced science: Faculty in the clusters are encouraged to submit proposals.





Democracy & Inclusion Draft Committee Goals

- Increase Student Exchange Programs: Expand the number of student exchange opportunities between the University of Illinois System and Brazilian universities.
- **Develop Collaborative Research Projects:** Initiate and support interdisciplinary research projects focused on democracy and inclusion with Brazilian institutions.
- Promote Cross-Cultural Understanding and Global Awareness: Facilitate workshops, seminars, and events that promote global awareness and cross-cultural understanding among students, faculty, and community members.
- Enhance Academic and Cultural Partnerships: Strengthen partnerships with key Brazilian institutions to support joint academic programs and cultural initiatives.
- Expand Curriculum on Democracy and Inclusion: Integrate content on democracy, inclusion, and cross-cultural engagement into existing courses and create new interdisciplinary courses.
- Foster Community Engagement and Social Impact: Collaborate with community organizations and local stakeholders in both Illinois and Brazil to promote civic engagement and social inclusion.
